

# **Tribal Setting and Review Background**

#### The Coushatta Tribe of LA is located in rural SW LA.

Approx. 250 of the 900 + members are Koasati speakers, most aged 20 & up Community is experiencing  $1^{st}$  generation of non-speakers

**Koasati (CKU)** is a Muskogean language. There are 3 federally recognized tribes with Coushattas, one in Louisiana, one in TX, and one in OK.

Just like all tribes, those in the Southeast have **DIFFERENT histories, backgrounds, experiences, etc. that can potentially impact Section 106 review process!** 





## Tribal Historic Preservation Office Coushatta Tribe of Louisiana

The primary mission of the Coushatta Tribal Historic Preservation Office is to:

- Promote, protect, preserve, and manage all matters relating to cultural resources that occur on current, historical and ancestral lands (lands currently located in 7 states).
- 2. Identify specific tribal goals, objectives, and activities to promote language and heritage revitalization and historic and cultural preservation, and
- 3. Carry out the tribe's responsibilities under the National Historic Preservation Act (NHPA).
- 4. The THPO is the **official point of contact** in all matters relating to cultural resources, and consults with Federal and State agencies regarding historic preservation and cultural resource matters of importance to the Tribe.
- 5. Our current preferences are: A) digital, paperless process; B) initial contact by email; C) contact us immediately w/all changes &/or problems


# **Coushatta Tribe of Louisiana**

Traditional cultural specialists look for things that others might not see:

- 1. Places where things happened but no visible markers remain
- 2. Burials where markers or fences washed away
- 3. Places where traditional plants are/were gathered
- 4. Places where dances, ceremonies or social events took place
- 5. Places where baptisms occurred
- 6. Locations of shared water wells
